# SCHOOL CLIMATE AND SAFETY

### Positive Learning Environment

Evergreen Valley High School is a safe and positive learning environment for our students. The school completes and reviews a yearly Safety Plan in a process including staff, parents, students and administration. We pride ourselves on the highest average daily attendance in the district, as well as one of the lowest disciplinary incident and suspension rates. Students are actively engaged in clubs, athletics, and student leadership. Families actively support their students. Teachers, administration, parents and students communicate regularly with each other through use of technology including e-mail, an outstanding website and Parent Connect. Our staff collaborate within and between departments to align content and instruction to district and state standards. The presence on campus of the University of California New Teacher Center staff and mentors aids the many teachers new to the profession, and provides both personnel and a body of knowledge to support EVHS's vision of education.

#### DROPOUT RATE

#### SCHOOL DESCRIPTION

The first new high school in the East Side in over 25 years, the beautiful campus of Evergreen Valley High school overlooks the Santa Clara Valley. January 2003 saw 880 9th and 10th graders move into the new school and begin an experiment in "re-visioning" high school. Evergreen Valley High School has set high expectations for student achievement, with state testing results on STAR and the High School Proficiency Exam second only to Piedmont Hills High School. Our enrollment continues to grow with construction on the east valley hillsides, raising our projected enrollment for 2005 to 2,200 students. Community expectations for Evergreen Valley High School are very high: parent communications with the school are routine; our facilities are used every weekend by community groups; parents participate as volunteers and in Performing Arts and Athletic Booster organizations; and requests for accelerated and Advanced Placement courses are among the highest in the district!

#### LEADERSHIP

The initial leadership design of four autonomous small schools each with a small school principal and specific staffing has changed. A centralized administration with principal, associate principals, counseling and discipline staff now supports teachers and students. The autonomous small schools with their core teaching groups and teacher advisors roles have also given way to a more traditional model of departmental support. The importance of equitable opportunities, equitable treatment of students, and use of standard processes and procedures for the East Side Union High School District has led to alignment with other schools in the district. The strength of staff and parent leadership can be seen in the work of the School Site Council, Staff Development Committee, Certificated Working Conditions Committee and the specific committees and departments. The needs of the community, the uncertain financial climate at the state and local level and the continuing growth of housing in our attendance area will result in changes in the foreseeable future.
